


Classes and Passing Time

- Students have a short passing time to walk between classes (4 min.). Since we do not have lockers, students can move quickly (while walking) from class to class.




Schedules and Classes



Attendance:

- Our goal is to see every student on-time, every day that school is in session.
- As parent/guardian, it is your responsibility to help your student(s) attend school every day.
- To excuse an absence, please send a written note from you with your student on the day they return to school.
- Note must include: date of absence, a short explanation of why the student was absent, and a signature from the parent/guardian.
- Note may be in most comfortable/native language.
- For example: My daughter, Sandra Calistoga, was absent on Wednesday 5/10/2018, because she was ill. Sincerely, Mr. Calistoga

Student Behavior:

Discipline guidelines and other important information can be found in our student handbook (linked from our school website)

"The Renton School District practices **progressive discipline** in response to most student misconduct..."

"The administration reserves the right to issue corrective actions (consequences) depending on the severity of individual incidents."

Student Discipline:

Consequences move up from minor behaviors to major behaviors:

 Defiance of school rules, disrespecting or disrupting the learning environment, health/safety violations, cell phone violations, verbal or physical fighting, harassment/intimidation/bullying, bringing unsafe or illegal substances or items to school

 Warning/verbal conference, other intervention, detention, in-school suspension, outof-school suspension, long-term suspension.



- Generally speaking, schools practice NOT getting involved in social media incidents, **unless** there is a nexus (connection) with school.
- Students should avoid engaging in online/electronic bullying or harassment.
- Investigating, mediating, and resolving issues that originated online can lead to very real consequences.



- Concerning types of behaviors or life-style representations online and on social networking sites may include:
 - peer conflicts
 - gang activity
 - criminal activity
 - drug and alcohol-related activity
 - bullying/harassment
 - sexual harassment or activity
 - illegal/illicit videos (fights, assaults, sexual acts)
 - pornography



- Students sometimes share personal information that you may not want "out there" about your student, yourself, or your family.
- Main concern: Students now have easy access and often the sites they can access are completely unsupervised.



- Students' images may also be used and posted on other sites without their own knowledge or your consent.
- Beware of multiple accounts... student shows you one, uses another.
- Once photos are shared, they can be posted anywhere.

How Parents Can Help:

Explain

Explain your expectations to your student – over and over again (reteach, re-direct, talk about earning trust).

Remind

Remind your student that any disruption connected to or at school involving online activities may result in school consequences.

Supervise

Supervise your student while they are online.

Monitor

Monitor all forms of electronic communication, spot-check the phone – texts, IMs, social media, messaging apps, etc.

How Parents Can Help, cont'd:

Speak to the parents of your student's friends – ensure that your expectations/values for your student are supported in those other households.

Implement firm, consistent, natural consequences in instances where your student violates your expectations for appropriate use of technology (i.e., you're paying the phone bill, so it's okay to stop paying for it, or take the phone away for some portion of time!
